BS/DO and BA/DO Program

What is a Doctor of Osteopathic (DO) medicine and what is the difference between MD and DO?

- ♣ Just like a medical doctor (MD), a doctor of osteopathic medicine (DO) is a physician licensed to practice medicine.
- MDs typically look to treat patients with medicine. DOs, on the other hand, look beyond a patient's symptoms to identify any other factors that may be impacting a patient's well-being.
- DOs are trained to view the patient as a whole person, taking into account not only the physical symptoms but also the emotional, mental, and spiritual aspects of health. This holistic approach is known as the osteopathic philosophy. MDs, on the other hand, primarily focus on the diagnosis and treatment of diseases using evidence-based medicine.
- Osteopathic doctors receive the same training as allopathic doctors. However, there are additional lessons and subjects offered at osteopathic medical schools.
- → Allopathic medical schools offer students a traditional medical curriculum whereas osteopathic medical schools offer lessons on areas like touch-based diagnoses.
- Another difference between DO and MD programs is the use of osteopathic manipulative treatment (OMT). OMT is a hands-on technique used by DOs to diagnose and treat musculoskeletal conditions. It involves gentle manual manipulation of the joints, muscles, and tissues to restore balance and promote healing. MDs do not receive training in OMT.
- ◆ Despite these differences, both DOs and MDs can practice in any specialty, and both are eligible for the same residencies and board certifications.
- **♣** DOs practice in all medical specialties, including as listed below (but not limited to):
 - ✓ Primary care
 - ✓ Pediatrics
 - √ Ob/gyn
 - ✓ Emergency medicine
 - ✓ Psychiatry
 - ✓ Surgery

What are the BS/DO and BA/DO Program requirements?

- ♣ BS/DO and BA/DO programs are
 - ✓ Highly Competitive (However less competitive than BS/MD and BA/MD)
 - ✓ Acceptance rate is very low
 - ✓ Take only 5-10 students per year
- Applicants must have
 - ✓ High GPA and Rigorous high school courses
 - ✓ Strong SAT or ACT scores (includes Super-score)
 - ✓ Evidence of interest in STEM (Research/Internships)
 - ✓ Clinical exposure/Volunteering/Dr. Shadowing
 - ✓ Stellar extracurricular activities/awards
 - ✓ Solid letters of recommendation to matriculate

Why You Should Consider DO Schools

- While most future physicians gravitate towards a traditional MD school for their education, the best DO schools have a lot to offer as well. Obtaining your Doctors of Osteopathic Medicine provides an alternative path to becoming a licensed physician.
- The end-goal remains the same, but DO medical schools take a different approach to get there. It also has the benefit of requiring a lower MCAT score and a lower GPA than most MD programs.
- Osteopathic medicine focuses on the entire body to treat ailments. It's about taking a "whole-person approach" to healing. Rather than focusing on specific health conditions or symptoms, osteopathic physicians work on helping patients achieve good overall health.
- When you earn a DO, you're still learning all of the core skills that you need to become a physician. You'll also have the same opportunities to specialize in the future. The primary difference is that DO programs center on providing long-term care.

When do you apply to BS/DO Programs?

- 4 Students can apply during their senior year of high school, along with the rest of their college applications.
- You will be required to apply to the undergraduate university that is part of the BS/DO program, along with a sort of <u>secondary application</u> to the actual dual-degree program itself. This special application can be found on the school's website, along with the deadline to submit.

Planning ahead is going to be critical for success

- ♣ Try to take 6-8 AP classes to be a competitive applicant
- ♣ Make sure you take all three science courses: Biology, Chemistry, and Physics
